



### SAME SEX UNIONS

### Italy has ceased to be an exception to the rest of Europe

Italy became the 27th country in Europe to legally recognise same-sex couples. On May 11th, the Italian Chamber of Deputies definitively approved the government's bill recognising same-sex civil unions, with 372 voting in favour, 51 against, and 99 abstaining. The world famous Trevi fountain in Rome was lighted up with the colours of rainbow, the symbol of LGBT movement, to celebrate.

After years of rancorous debate, this result bases its roots in two relevant circumstances.

Last year, the European Court of Human Rights ruled that Italy was infringing upon human rights in failing to acknowledge gay unions. Also, the law reflects changing attitudes towards homosexuality even in Roman Catholic countries. Pope Francis has used more conciliatory language than his predecessors and has met prominent gay figures such as Tim Cook, the CEO of Apple. At the same time, the official doctrine remains that same-sex unions cannot be considered the same as heterosexual marriages.

Gay-rights activists have been pushing for same-sex marriage in Italy for three decades; bills have been proposed in the past but never adopted.

Now, same-sex couples in Italy will have many of the same rights as married heterosexual couples. For instance they can



can apply for public housing as couples, they have the right to receive a deceased partners' pension, and to inherit each others' assets. Partners will also be able to decide on their surname: keeping their own, taking the other person's, or combining the two.

Partners have the same access rights as a spouse in the event of incarceration or admission to hospital. Moreover, they can take over lease agreements or be entitled to remain in their partner's property for up to five years in the event of a partner's death. Finally, it will be much easier to dissolve the union than it is to end a marriage, and they will be entitled to claim maintenance in the event of separation.

The same law also recognizes these rights to unmarried heterosexual couples. However, the gap between the rights recognized to civil unions and to full marriage rights seems considerable.

To ensure passage in the Senate, the original version was amended in February by scrapping a clause that would have allowed members of gay civil unions to adopt their partners' children. Rulings on adoption matters will be made by judges on a case-by-case basis.

In fact, a few days after approving the bill, the Supreme Court authorized a woman to adopt her partner's baby girl. The lesbian couple had gone to Spain for medically-assisted procreation. Then they came back to Italy and the Supreme Court justices considered that the child had lived with both parents from birth, "in a familial context and within a scholastic and social context analogous to

those of children her age." (sentence 1296/2016)

In its definition of a civil union, the bill refers to "moral and material support and cohabitation,, just like marriage, but one key aspect is missing. A duty of fidelity or faithfulness between homosexual couples was dropped from the bill because conservatives said it smacked too much of traditional marriage, provoking strong outcry among the LGBT community.

This bill was a big test for this cabinet. In order to pass the bill, the government was forced to resort to calling two confidence motions to push it through. It was the first time in Italy that this kind of procedure has been adopted to obtain a positive vote by the Parliament on a civil rights matter.

### ITALIAN-AMERICAN MUSEUM OPENS

The Italian-American Museum of Los Angeles opened its doors to the public on August 14th as a 21st century, world-class museum examining the history and ongoing contributions of Italian Americans in Southern California and beyond.

"The Italian American
Museum of Los Angeles offers
us the opportunity to share
our city's deeply rooted and
substantial history of Italian
Americans with our fellow
Angelenos and indeed, with
millions of visitors from
throughout the world," said
Los Angeles City Councilman
José Huizar, whose district
includes the IAMLA.

The \$4.5 million museum is highly interactive and

uses technology to touch on everything from the original Little Italy (where Chinatown now stands) to Dodgers legend Tommy Lasorda. In a 6,000-square-foot space on the second floor of the renovated 1908 Italian Hall, the museum holds a collection of maps, letters and photographs relating to the past and present Italian community.

The museum's permanent collection contains roughly 4,000 items. Works are displayed in a venue with a minimalist, modern design.

There is also a high-tech component. At each glass case there is a touchscreen tablet with text, video and photos, which visitors can scroll through. The most notable



elements in the museum are three 10-by-12-foot glass panels where photos, videos and more are displayed via projectors; the images are constantly changing.

The second display area includes seven glass cases that

explore a variety of subjects, from the pioneers who came to the city to the initial settlement to Italian culture to anti-Italian American sentiment.
